President's Letter

I would like to welcome everyone back as we begin our 85th season of golf at Ballston Spa Country Club. I am hoping that as you read this first issue of the Fox for the 2010 golf season, we are playing golf or are very close to playing golf at BSCC.

Steve has been extremely busy during the winter months. Trees along the 7th tee, a new bridge over the creek on 12 and of course equipment maintenance and repair are just a few things that kept Steve and his crew busy this winter. Please look for an update from Sue or Steve in this issue with more details on Steve's winter work and other course news.

BSCC participated in the Malta Golf Show held at the Malta Community Center. The event was very well attended and there was a lot of interest in our club. We have also had very positive feedback on our Trial Membership Program.

I would like to remind you about a couple of items that I mentioned in my letter to the membership that was included in the invoices. The reduced quests rate of 3 quests for \$60 will be valid only until the end of April instead of May like we advertised in the fall. The guest passes issued in the fall will be valid until the end of May.

There has also been some confusion about guest play at BSCC. An individual may play only 6 times (as a guest) during the golf season. That is 6 times total, not 6 times as a guest of member A and 6 more times as a guest of member B. We have asked Todd and his staff to strictly monitor and enforce this policy. Therefore, I ask for your cooperation when Todd asks for your quest's name. He may also ask for your quest to sign-in in the Pro Shop. Of course, anyone is welcome to play Monday through Thursday at the public play rate, but once 6 times as a quest is reached, they are no longer allowed to play Friday, Saturday, Sunday or holidays.

There is a lot to be excited about as we begin this season. Interest in our club and in memberships is up from a year ago, our attrition has returned to a normal level and we are pleased to have Tony Panza and his staff on board. Global Foundries is becoming a reality and that can only benefit BSCC with what it will bring to the area.

I want to welcome everyone back. This past winter moved rather fast, at least it seemed that way to me. The small amount of snow we had made conditions great for working out on the course. In the past, it always has been such a pain trying to work out there with two feet of snow to work through. We had the perfect weather for tree work and for completing some projects. The ground was frozen and there was enough snow cover to protect the turf. Other than encountering some mechanical problems, Ed, Chad and I were able to put a lot of time into the course, making the winter seem to fly right on by.

As you already know, the club purchased five greens covers last fall. This was a direct response to the ice damage suffered last year. Research was conducted last season to find the best protection for our greens during the unpredictable winter that Ballston Spa faces every year. The covers that were purchased are solid covers that are designed to prevent water from freezing on the green surface. After everything melted this past week, we are able to see that the covers worked great! The only problem that we had was with #9. I experimented with using perforated piping on this green to help change the air out underneath the cover during the winter. The lack of continued snow cover and the air gaps made by the piping made the cover susceptible to blowing off the green under heavy winds. This happened several times this winter and water was then able to freeze in the low areas in the front of the green and kill turf. This is the only damage suffered on our greens and does not even compare to the severity of the damage we had last year. So, it is my conclusion that these covers are a great protection for our greens and I hope we can purchase more of them. In the future, we just have to secure the covers to the ground better.

Once we were able to put the course to bed in late November, we started with this year's tree work. The majority of the tree work was done behind the #14 green. Before this tree work was done, this green would have trouble drying out. The lack of air flow through this area would make the green suffer during the hot humid times of the season. Black algae would form and choke out the bentgrass and the poa. The lack of sufficient sunlight during the spring and fall months would also hinder the green. Other tree work was done near the #7 tee area and the #6 tee. This yearly tree work is in an effort to provide quality turfgrass throughout the property and to give the cleanest looking golf course as possible.

One of the problems facing the greens that were not covered this winter is ice buildup. As you know, ice buildup over the winter can kill turf. This past January, we had a few days when the snow melted and then refroze to form a layer of ice. We took quick action to melt the ice on the non-covered greens. The now exposed greens faced another winter challenge, the contrast of warmer temperature during the day to extreme colds at night. We can see some severe tip burn on those greens this spring. The uncovered greens will be OK! They will just take a little longer to green up. If we would have left the ice on those greens all winter, we most likely would have lost at least some of those greens. We just can't seem to win without winter injury.

Lastly, Chad, Ed, and I kept ourselves busy with fixing equipment, rebuilding the #12 bridge, and installing a new grease trap for the clubhouse. It has been a great winter. We accomplished a lot every week. Our hard work will make our springtime easier. These time consuming project are done. We cleaned up most of the tree work as we worked, saving us time in the spring. I know our efforts to keep the greens from dying will save us a huge amount of time in the spring as well. All in all, I hope you are happy with the progress and are ready for another season to begin, which is only days away.











Once again we are back at it for another exciting season at Ballston Spa Country Club. Steve and his staff have been hard at work all winter cleaning up the golf course visually so the air movement will improve turf conditions throughout the summer months.

I have purchased a new High Definition video camera to help everyone see their swings in a clear light with the slow motion enhanced quality that is easy for everyone to learn. I will be available more this season for lessons as I will have my father working 3 days a week in the golf shop this season.

We have some great ideas for this season to make yours enjoyable. If anyone has any ideas or comments to further enhance the golf operation, please don't hesitate to send them along as we are here to service the membership as best as possible.

Golf Shop Staff

As most of you know, Tony Panza of Panza's Restaurant on Saratoga Lake is our new caterer. Panza's is well known in the area and the family has been in the restaurant business for over 70 years. We have had several meetings with Tony Panza and his staff and they are very eager to start the season. Many of our Members have indicated they know the Panza reputation, have visited their restaurant and are looking forward to the season. Tony also has experience catering at golf courses, having operated McGregor Links successfully several years ago.

We are optimistic that with Tony Panza the Club will have a long term relationship with an excellent caterer.

Since the start of the 2010 golf season is rapidly approaching, we need to outline the plan for administration of the GHIN system. When the handicap committee and I started exploring the GHIN system all it has to offer, it occurred to us that for some it may be rather intimidating. With that in mind, we'd like to begin by assuring everyone that if you apply a few basic principles the rest will take care of itself. Below please see some basic guidelines that you should be following not only at the beginning of our season but all season long.

First and probably most importantly – with few exceptions you should enter your adjusted score shortly following **each time you play golf.** The most popular exception to this would be when you play in a scramble. Each time you play golf means match play events (leagues) as well as incomplete rounds, 9 holes for instance.

Next, always use the equitable stroke control (ESC) table to determine what score to enter for each hole. This table can be found at the computer where scores can be entered.

The following are 3 of the most common questions / points that have recently been asked of the handicap committee therefore please see the question and it's answer –

Tournaments & handicap Committee Report (continued)

q) I am member of two clubs – one here and one in Florida. How should I handle entering my scores?a) If your club is on the GHIN network we can enter the club affiliation into the system and all scores from that club entered during the active season will be used and applied to your handicap. All we need is the club information.

q) When does our "active" season begin?

a) From April 9, 2010 all local scores should be entered into the system. Any golf played (locally) before that should not be entered into GHIN. Internet posting is possible too at <u>www.ghin.com/posting.shtml</u>

q) How does the GHIN system know if someone is being honest?

a) It doesn't. GHIN operates under the assumption that each golfer is honest and that his/her fellow golfers will help him/her maintain their honesty. It is what's called a "peer review" system. This is one of the main reasons that everyone's scores are viewable by all other golfers. This system is completely transparent.
