

## President's Letter

The Board received the latest financial report just a week ago and the financial data looks good, not great, but we are more comfortable with how the year will end. Of course, we do have an emergent

expense getting the irrigation system repaired and working again.

We are estimating to end the year with approximately \$85,800 on hand. \$35,000 of that is in a reserve fund used only for emergencies and \$43,000 will be used to pay off shareholders waiting for share repayment. If all goes as planned, those shareholders will be paid off early in 2010. That will leave us with approximately \$18,000 to start the year and meet our early 2010 expenses before we start receiving our 2010 dues.

Over the past few years, we have been trying to buy Steve the equipment he needs to get his job done in the most efficient manner possible and provide us the best possible conditions. We have used our course improvement assessment to purchase some key pieces of used equipment.

The problem we have encountered over the past few weeks is a rash of this used equipment breaking down and needing repairs. Steve and Chad (our mechanic) do a great job of repairing many of the problems. However, the parts are still expensive and our maintenance budget is increasing each year. The used dump truck (the red one) has a broken bed frame. We use this truck to plow the parking lot and do all of our heavy hauling. Steve is trying to find a way to replace the frame since we do not want to spend any money on a replacement. There is more important equipment that we need so it will be challenging to find ways to purchase the equipment without breaking the budget. One piece of equipment that was purchased last year was a deep tiner. When I played golf today (9/20/09, Men's League outing), a number of people were commenting about how good the greens were. As we all know, we had problems with our greens in years past but the deep tiner was key to allowing our greens to weather the summer months better than in years past.

I would like to thank everyone who purchased raffle tickets for the winter green covers. We ultimately sold 174 tickets and raised enough to purchase 3 or 4 covers. Look for Dick Cody's article in this issue of the Fox for more details.

With this being the last Fox of the year, I would like to take a minute to thank Todd and his entire staff for another great year. Todd and his staff are simply the best and they take care of all our pro shop needs throughout the year.

I would like to thank Steve and his staff for an outstanding job all year long. We sometimes take for granted the work that Steve does, but what Steve accomplishes on the budget he has to work with is nothing short of miraculous.



### Parring the 19th
