

President's Letter

As we approach the end of the 2010 golf season, the Board has already started working on the budget for the 2011 season. We have drafted a preliminary budget that we will continue to refine over the next four to six weeks.

I would like to address the realities of our budget in this final Fox of the year. Over the past few years, we have had relatively small dues increases. Those increases were expected to meet our increased expenses in the coming year. Those dues increases do not provide us with any significant increased revenue to put towards equipment or course projects. Our typical budget is always balanced (revenue equals or slightly exceeds expenses). The Board is always looking for places to save money in our budget and use that money for items in the budget associated with golf course main-

tenance. That might mean a few thousand dollars more in course labor or maybe additional money in maintenance because we know our equipment is getting older. While Steve does a great job finding quality used equipment, it ultimately requires maintenance sooner than new equipment would. New equipment however is often cost prohibitive and out of reach for us. For example, a new sprayer can cost over \$40,000 and that is more than we have collected in any year for our course improvement fund.

As a result of our budget being one that supports operating expenses only, the course improvement fund is critical in providing additional funds to purchase equipment, purchase a new pump for the irrigation system, lumber for a new bridge or other improvements to the golf course. That fund has netted us anywhere from \$22,000 to \$30,000 over the past years, depending on the amount requested from the membership.

The key to moving forward in a more accelerated manner is to increase our membership. At our current membership level (approximately 325 playing members), we generate roughly \$560,000 in revenue. That is about 60% of our total revenue. If we were to increase our membership to 375 playing members, that would potentially increase our membership revenue by \$80,000 to \$100,000 depending on the ratio of memberships (single vs. family memberships). That is three times what we generate in our course improvement fund in any one year. That would allow us to make more improvements, purchase some new equipment or start a fund for larger future projects.

We are certainly working hard to make BSCC as attractive as possible for potential new members. With Global Foundries starting to hire we are optimistic about our future membership levels. However, until membership increases, the course improvement fund remains key.

I would also like to take this opportunity to provide you with a final update on how much we have saved this year in our credit card charges. Through August of this year credit card charges totaled \$6550. Through the same time last year our charges were \$11,985 for a savings so far this year of \$5,435.

I certainly hope you all enjoyed the 2010 season and I look forward to seeing you again next year.

Superintendent's Report

These past few weeks have been great weather wise for growing grass. Cool nights and sunny days have really improved the turf on the course. Although there are still some areas on the course that need to fill in, overall we are in pretty good shape. We will be aerifying all the greens, tees, and fairways this fall. As you know, this process is very important for plant health and is also a great opportunity to put down some seed in areas that have died over the summer.

After Labor Day, my crew and I started the long process of aerifying the course. We started with the fairways on the front 9. The aerifying process on the front 9 went as smooth as it could possibly go. The sun dried the plugs great allowing us to pick them up and break them up. We could not possibly pick up every plug on every fairway so we usually pulverize some of the plugs with a drag mat. All our equipment worked great and we had no breakdowns. The back 9 was a different story. The sun was not out and the plugs were not drying out. Consequently, some of the plugs were mashed into the turf and are still there. Eventually the grass will fill in around the smashed plug and the fairways will look like they did in the spring and early summer. Our new core harvester worked great. We collected a lot of plugs that we will use in future projects.

The greens will be aerified on the 29th and 30th of September. Due to the large number of outings and tournaments that we have this month, the greens aerification dates have been pushed back to the end of the month instead of after Labor Day like we used to do.

One problem about aerifying later in the fall is temperature. The temperature at the end of September is a lot colder than it is in the beginning. Consequently, the greens will take longer to fill in. The grass loves cooler weather to grow in but usually at the end of September you are dealing with frost every morning. Freezing temperatures do not help with growing grass. Your growth time each day become shorter and the grass takes longer to recover. It is important that the greens fill in completely before the cold days of winter end the grass growing season. The healthier the turf all over the course is when winter comes, the better it will be able to withstand the frigid temperatures, snow, and ice of the winter months. If we go into the winter healthy, we will increase our chances to enter spring healthy.

Green Committee Report

It's hard to believe I'm writing this for the last issue of the Fox this season. It was a terrific summer for playing but very challenging for Steve and his crew. They stood up to a number of challenges through out the summer, from extreme temperatures to equipment failures and kept the course in great condition. Now that the cooler weather has arrived we expect the conditions to be even better throughout the fall months.



Like it or not, September is the month where necessary aeration takes place. As you know the fairways were aerified the first week of the month and by the time you read this the greens will also have been done. The process this year was much improved due to the purchase of a core harvester. This piece of equipment allows Steve to pick up the plugs more efficiently while also helping to stock pile them for future use. You probably noticed a good use of the plugs on hole #13, to redirect the existing cart path.

One area of the course which continues to concern the owners is the health of our greens. Our greens were very healthy early in the season but showed distress during the long hot stretch of weather in July and August. The Green Committee recently discussed what can be done to keep them healthy all season. To achieve better consistency, next season the height of the greens mowers will be increased slightly and maintained at a consistent level all season. A very slight increase in mower height will encourage root development, reduce the need for constant watering and prevent mid-season burn out when the hot, dry weather arrives. Continued use of the roller along with frequent deep tine aerification followed by verticutting and top dressing will also be done to make sure the greens are smooth.

As is true at the end of every season there are a lot of projects that need to be done to put the course to bed for the winter. **This year's Project Day will be October 23rd, starting at 8:30am.** We need your help completing a long to-do list such as cutting back all the grasses and perennials, feeding the shrubs, help to lay sod, remove overgrowth around tees, etc. Many hands make light work so with a large group of volunteers we should be able to get all the work done in a few short hours. Hope to see you the morning of the 23rd.

Finally, the 2011 budget is in development. While a dues increase is always a primary concern at budget time we will be focusing on developing an equipment purchasing plan and separate budget. Hopefully we will be able to implement such as plan in the very near future. It's hard to believe I'm writing this for the last issue of the Fox this season. Handicap Committee Update



This year the handicap committee has intentionally taken a rather low profile in an attempt to remain as supportive as possible, and not too obtrusive. There have been a few question asked about certain handicapping scenarios of which we have resolved. By and large the participation the members have taken in the GHIN system and it's guidelines has been very good – thank you all for that.

Next year we have plans to provide even more support in that we will be posting more information and getting closer and closer to true compliance. One of the first steps to getting us up to speed is to make sure that our course is rated properly. Through a rather lengthy scheduling process it was decided that Thursday, August 19th would be the day of the re-rating. Another member of the handicap committee and I met the re-rating team at the club at 8am and this is where the fun began. Initially, the re-rating team was understandably standoffish and once they saw that we were making no attempt to influence their opinion or process, they warmed right up. As for the re-rating process; trust me when I tell you it was more thorough and comprehensive than I could have ever imagined. Please picture 5 people, all from the NYSGA (New York State Golf Association), going hole by hole, all taking measurements from 8am until just before 1pm. They took measurements from virtually every possible spot a ball could go. They measured every hazard, fairway angle and distance from where they estimated a scratch golfer and bogey golfer alike could/would hit the ball. There were measurements from the center of the fairway to not only the edge of the fairway, but to the rough then to what they called the extreme rough or out of bounds / woods etc. This was done at several different distances from each set of tees. After this was completed on a certain hole they would gather on the green and make assessments of what severity the green was and how it could affect play. Furthermore, they had a stimp meter that they used to judge the speed of our greens; by the way our greens that day were running at an 8.6 on the stimp meter.

To summarize the day - I would simply say it was a pleasure to get to see the process that was used to rate our course and that I feel very comfortable that our course rating will be accurately reflected when we get the report back. The person in charge of the re-rating informed me that it can take any where from 2-3 months to get all the data into the program and get the results from the re-rating days activities. One thing I did address was that when many others come to our course they never seem to play to their handicap rating - they all seemed to think that the re-rating will help.

One question that has already been asked is how my handicap change once the new rating goes into effect. Basically, it will change gradually with each score you enter (at the new rating). We will not go back and adjust the scores or apply the new course ratings for previously played rounds. Another good thing will be that this re-rating will likely go into effect at the very end of our golfing season thus enabling everyone to begin next year with the new rating.

Parring the 19th

Having dealt with my two golfing weather phobias (rain and wind), I would like to complete the trifecta with a third meteorological blight on my handicap, that being cold weather and its many manifestations. Because I am a Canuck, one would think a lot of my golfing experiences in subzero (Celsius) temperatures would have occurred "north of the 49th" as we Hosers like to say. But no, pretty much all of my golf in frigid atmospheric conditions has occurred in the contiguous 48.

I have a knack, it seems, at arriving at southern golf locales on beautiful sunny days with above average temperatures and no plans to golf that day. This is the Weather Golf Gods having a little yuk at my expense, as the next (golfing) day always morphs quickly into a Canadian Arctic air mass (Oh! The irony!) that would fast freeze Jerry Lee Lewis's great balls of fire.



This has happened twice. Once at Myrtle Beach on March 7 (Average air temperature: 68 degrees). My son and I had arrived the day before in glorious sunshine and 75 degrees. On the morning of March 8th, I listened to a starter at the first of our scheduled golf courses tell me that the wind chill was 18 degrees and that he couldn't let me out until it warmed up.

Years later, I arrived the day before our annual golf orgy in Ocean City, Maryland, again in March (Average temperature: 60 degrees) to outstanding mid-seventies temps and not a breath of wind. Next (golfing) day, we awoke to a cocktail of wind and a 38 degree air temperature mixed lightly with rain. There was only one course open that day. The Ranger had advised us to hit about 5 clubs more than the distance would normally require, due to the hurricane force winds, so we were making dungeon humor jokes and calculating our club choice (driver) on the 150 yard hole. We were right on the inland sea and my partner, visibly shaking from the cold and wind and rain, turned to me and said, "All I need to see right now is the freakin' Edmund Fitzgerald go by and I'm outa here".

Much the same weather was prevailing in southern New Jersey at the Atlantic City Country Club one year. OK. So far we have dealt with a rapidly moving gas and a cold liquid, however, there is another element, a solid, that is often associated with cold. That's right, my barometric buddies - snow.

The only time I played golf when it was actually snowing was in a tournament run by June and Kenny Bowler's two sons, aptly named The Open Container Invitational Golf Tournament (the Tournament, not their sons), held one year at Galway Golf Club on

December 4th. That is not a typo.



Big, wet snowflakes filled the air on the second nine and I watched the group ahead of us contemplating what to do about a ball that went onto a pond ("onto" because there was a thin covering of ice.) The determined golfer waded into the pond, asked for his hockey stick (this will be explained in a future column - it was a very unusual tournament) and slapshot the ball off the pond. The greens were whiting up quite rapidly by the end of the round and the wet snow grew the golf ball significantly, depending of course, on the length of the putt. Breaks were neither readable nor of any significance.

So there you have it, a frigid finale to my meteorological triumvirate of golfing neuroses. As we head into the Fall, I can only wish you sunny skies, calm winds and warm rounds.
